London Workplace Zones Classification:

Users' Guide

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1. Introduction

Following the 2011 Census of the Population, a new output geography called Workplace Zones was built for England and Wales to better represent working population distributions. Census outputs on this geography enabled the creation of geodemographic classifications of the workplace populations, starting with the Classification of Workplace Zones for England and Wales (COWZ-EW) developed by the University of Southampton (CoWZ: HTTP://COWZ.GEODATA.SOTON.AC.UK/). The current work builds on COWZ to construct a workplace typology for Greater London that gives better differentiation for London than the national classification.

A key feature of the new classification is that it includes a wider range of data, from both Census and other sources than just the workplace statistics. A variety of data sources were investigated for inclusion to reflect the domains considered relevant to this of: Employment Structure, Dynamism/Attractiveness, Employee Characteristics, Job Characteristics, Commuting/Connections and Residential Context. These domains were used purely as a conceptual framework for identifying data for inclusion. They play no further part in the subsequent analysis.

Following evaluation for availability at the appropriate geographical detail (and processing where necessary to achieve this), robustness, relevance and the value that they brought to the analysis, an original set of 152 indicators was narrowed down to 92 for inclusion in the development of the classification. Full detail of the variables, manipulation and selection are given in the Technical Report.

Each of these 92 variables was then included with equal weight in a cluster analysis which produced five groups within London with roughly even numbers of workplace zones in each. A second tier of sub groups was created using a second cluster analysis within each group. This resulted in 11 sub groups – four groups split into two sub groups each and the fifth with three sub groups.

After the cluster analysis had been completed, it was found that a few Workplace Zones in London showed implausible characteristics. Five of these could be clearly identified as wrong to the extent that we believe they would not have been created as workplace zones had the correct information been used and these workplace zones have therefore been suppressed in the published classification (Designated Group F in Section 3).

Various representations of the results have been produced. The London DataStore has pages at HTTPS://DATA.LONDON.GOV.UK/CENSUS/LWZC/ that not only allow users to download the raw

data or to select the data required in spreadsheet format, there are also pages that include a postcode search to find its zone, group and sub group and give interactive visual representations in the form of maps, spider charts and bar charts showing the variables for each group and sub group. The Consumer Data Research Centre also hosts interactive maps of the classification at https://maps.cdm.uk/#/GEODEMOGRAPHICS/LCOWZ17/, alongside a wide range of other maps, including the national Classification of Workplace Zones and the London Output Area Classification. Charts in Appendix B of the technical report show for each variable how the group varies from the London average.

2. The Clusters

2.1 Group Level Clusters

A summary of the group level cluster distribution is shown in Table 1¹. Both the workplace population and numbers of workplace zones are reasonably evenly distributed, except for one cluster, B, that contains nearly a third of the population, though the number of workplace zones is similar to that for the other groups. These clusters are mapped for London in Figure 1.



2.2 Sub Group Level Clusters

The second tier of the classification was created by using the original input data to create sub divisions of the Group level clusters shown above. After exploration of a range of results, those Sub Groups that showed the most effective partitioning in terms of within and between Group differentiation are presented in Table 2. All groups were partitioned into two except D, which split into three Sub Groups.

3. Describing the clusters

3.1 Overview

There are various ways in which the clusters can be described: some of these are given in the Technical Report, while maps and other visual representations are available on the web sites given above.

In these representations, the figures for the average score on each variable for each cluster are often given relative to the London average. Commonly these scores are presented as an index score, where 100 equates to the average, 50 a half, and 200 as double. It is common practice to examine scores with an index of over 120; however, also considering those scores that may be as a result of a low count within Greater London. For each cluster, those variables that have a score over 120 were selected, and are presented in the profiles below.

The Groups and Sub Groups were assigned names and summary descriptions based on the characteristics which particularly stood out. However, these should not be taken to mean that these are the only differences from the London average, nor that they apply equally to all workplace zones within each cluster. The final hierarchy of labels are presented on the next page; and the fuller profiles and descriptions in the next two sections.

• Group - A: Residential Services

- o A1: Predominantly older, local education and health workers
- o A2: Lowly qualified workers in construction and allied local trades

• Group – B: City Focus

- o B1: Dynamic financial centres with extended operating hours
- B2: Professional, retail and leisure Services in dynamic central locations

• Group – C: Infrastructure Support

- o C1: Younger customer service workers in wholesale or retail occupations
- o C2: Blue collar, manufacturing and transport services

• Group – D: Integrating and Independent Service Providers

- o D1: Health care support staff and routine service occupations
- o D2 Locally sourced, home helps and domestic or manual workers
- o D3: Travelling or home-based general service providers

• Group – E: Metropolitan Destinations

- o E1: High street destinations and domestic employers
- o E2: Accessible retail, leisure and tourist services

• F- Data Not Available



3.2 Additional information used in describing the clusters

Two elements of data were used in creating the more detailed profiles describing the clusters, given in sections 3.3 and 3.4 below. Data not used in creating the clusters, but collected as part of the original data collection and evaluation, particularly data on the residential context were considered and data from footfall sensors². were used to explore the dynamics of workplace zones. It should be noted that these sensors are not distributed evenly between clusters, or spatially: Westminster workplace zones are more likely to include footfall sensors than some other areas, as shown in Figure 2.

The average footfall for each cluster was calculated from the available observations. These varied by time of day and day of the week. The charts generated to show this are given in Figure 3-6.

FIGURE 3: AVERAGE OF FOOTFALL BY TIME OF THE DAY, WEEKDAYS (GROUPS)




FIGURE 4: AVERAGE OF FOOTFALL BY TIME OF THE DAY, WEEKENDS (GROUPS)




FIGURE 5: AVERAGE OF FOOTFALL BY TIME OF THE DAY, WEEKDAYS (SUB GROUPS)






FIGURE 6: AVERAGE OF FOOTFALL BY TIME OF THE DAY, WEEKENDS (SUB GROUPS)

Group – A: Residential Services



These workplace zones are characterized by services offered to local communities by local community members. Occupations include classroom assistants, domestic assistants and self employed cleaners. Workers, particularly women are typically older than average and some above normal retirement age.



Group – B: City Focus



These areas bring focus to a range of specialised professional activities. They also host more general support services and retail activities. The portfolio of over-all activities may also be catalytic to the vitality of nighttime economies. Workers in all of these activities are predominantly drawn from a core (age 25-39) labour force.





Group – D: Integrating and Independent Service Providers



These areas are characterised by high levels of self employment, and significant numbers work parttime. Workers may be based at home, or travel to deliver services to local communities. The areas attest to the dynamism of London's economy in recent years, providing employment for recent migrants and longer settled members of ethnic minorities. These zones predominantly make up an annular tract of land surrounding the inner core of London.





These workers are frequently sourced locally, and predominantly work in the health and education sectors. Caring and leisure services are well represented, and some individuals work in professional occupations.




